

# Can summative assessment be used formatively?

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#### **Summative Vs. Formative Assessment**

#### **Summative:**

Evaluate students' learning at the end of a particular period of study; used to determine what students have learned and thus report on their progress.

#### Formative:

Monitor students' learning while it occurs, conducted DURING the learning process; allows students and teachers to identify strengths and areas for improvement.



#### **Summative Vs. Formative Assessment**

"When the cook tastes the soup, that's formative assessment; when the customer tastes the soup, that's summative assessment."

# Summative Vs. Formative Assessment: Typical activities

- Proficiency exam
- Portfolios
- Self-assessment
- Quizzes
- Projects
- Oral presentations
- Detailed comments on a piece of written homework

- Final essay (after several drafts)
- Observations
- In-class Q&A
- End of chapter test
- Peer Assessment
- Journals
- Discussions
- State or national exam



#### **Test-dominated contexts**

'Teaching to the test' is a type of teaching that focuses on preparing students for high-stakes, standardized tests; the common use of tests and test-preparation activities become a feature of everyday classroom practice





# Formative Use of Summative Testing (FUST)

In an exam culture, a positive 'synergy' between formative and summative assessment is necessary for effective implementation of formative assessment.

# **FUST: Strategies**

#### **Pre-test preparation:**

- Share success criteria/test rubrics
- Share previous learner test responses
- Have students create mock test papers



# **FUST: Strategies**

#### **Test Results:**

- Consider peer marking
- Analyze & look for patterns
- Give more than just a grade
- Allow for contemplation



# **FUST: Strategies**

#### Post-test follow-up:

- Allow time for post-test follow-up!
- Conduct test follow-up sessions
- Feedback on your feedback
- Peer-learning activity: Re-work exam questions



# **FUST: Challenges**

- Feedback is test related
- Grades remain important
- Doesn't appeal to all students
- Summative test is still dominant
